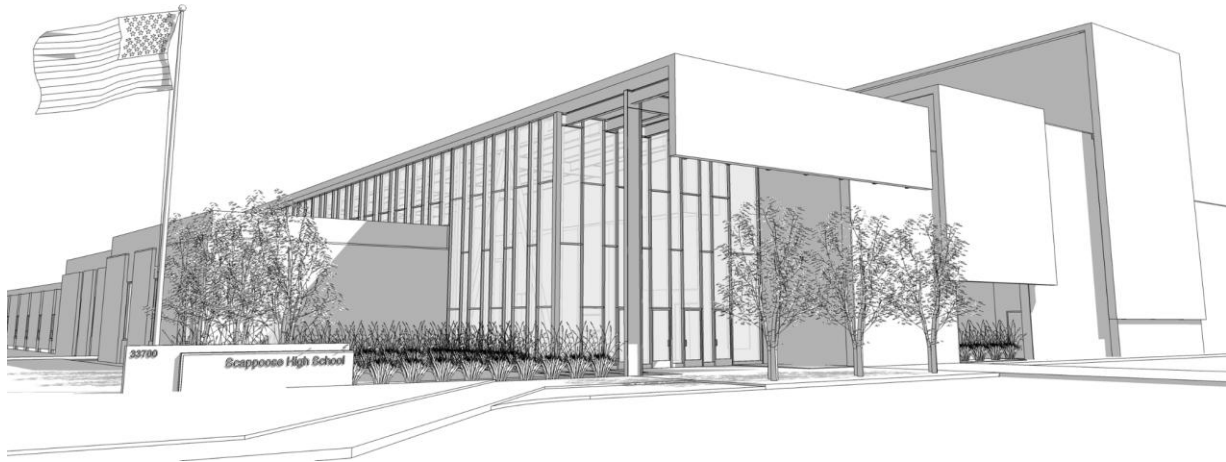

The US and the Holocaust

Teacher: Atkins

The US and the Holocaust “It is a fantastic commentary on the inhumanity of our times that for thousands and thousands of people a piece of paper with a stamp on it is the difference between life and death.” Dorothy Thompson, Journalist, 1938 We are going to try for a dive into how the American people grappled with one of the greatest humanitarian crises of the twentieth century, and how this struggle tested the ideals of our democracy. By examining the periods leading up to and during the Holocaust with fresh eyes, we will examine competing myths that Americans either were ignorant of the unspeakable persecution that Jews faced in Europe, or that they looked on with callous indifference. We will look at the roles that eugenics and racism, as well as xenophobia and antisemitism, played during this crisis and throughout American history. In the process the materials will grapple with questions that remain essential to our society today: Is America, truly, as it claims to be, a land of immigrants? Why did we fail to rescue people at the time of their greatest need? How do the continued struggles over how we define our past shape our future as a country?

Pygmalion Deconstructed

Many folks have heard of the myth of Pygmalion, who sculpted the "perfect" woman and then fell in love with her. How does this idea continue to echo throughout our society, especially in our makeover-crazed world? From classics ("Gigi" "My Fair Lady") to more recent classics ("Pretty Woman" "She's All That") to gender-flipped makeovers of guys ("Can't Buy me Love" "The Shape of Things"), come see how love is sometimes a lot more than skin deep.

The Journey of Knowing Yourself

The only person you can truly know on the inside is yourself. Only you know what you are really thinking and feeling - which means that only you have the ability to discover who you really are. Knowing ourselves is really hard, but it's a properly exciting task. Everyone needs to go on journeys of self-exploration, but because they are hard, many of us never get around to it. Sometimes people tell you they are 'too busy' to be self-explorers, but that's likely to be an excuse. Socrates, a philosopher who lived a long time ago in Greece, said that the purpose of life was to "Know yourself". Join us as we delve into the deepest mystery there is... who am I?

Double Vision: Ping Pong & Cribbage

Teacher: Byrd and Poster

The purpose of this course is to introduce students to basic skills and knowledge associated with the game of table tennis. By applying these principles through active participation, students develop the necessary skills and knowledge to pursue the game of table tennis as a lifetime activity. The course will provide students the opportunity to increase their individual level of physical fitness and demonstrate an understanding of the game of table tennis. This class is open to all levels of table tennis players. Participation is required to pass the class.

American Sign Language 1&2

ASL I + II is an introduction to American Sign Language and the Deaf community. ASL I students will learn basic vocabulary and cultural foundations of ASL and begin to learn to express themselves through signing by using concrete ideas and finger spelling. ASL II students will continue to develop their ASL skills and help teach the ASL I. This course will also provide introductory information on Deaf culture, since a language cannot be separated from its culture. This course does not meet requirements for Foreign Language credit.

What's Your Type?: A Computer Skills Speedrun

Learn how to use Docs, Slides, Sheets and more, and improve your typing skills while you're at it! We will also dabble in digital design with programs like Canva. You will learn valuable skills that you'll use in college and/or careers, and be better prepared for our digital world.

Applied Chemistry

Teacher: Fountain-Miller and Pinkstaff

This class is designed to showcase how chemistry is used in everyday life. Topics will include physical and chemical changes, the periodic table, oxidation reactions, consumer chemistry, and nutrition/food chemistry. Lab activities will be the primary focus of this class, with support from text materials.

World Mythology

This course focuses on the many mythologies that exist across the globe, past and present. Starting with a review of Greek mythology, we'll then branch out to look at the commonalities of world mythologies, the fun and sometimes horrifying differences, and dip our toes into Jungian psychology and archetypes and how they form a bridge from these myths to our reality.

Publications

Tribal Studies

Teacher: Holzworth

This class will study Native Americans with a focus on our local tribes including the Chinook and the Confederated Tribes of the Grand Ronde. The teacher, along with guest speakers, seminars, readings and daily lessons, will examine the captivating culture of Native Americans

through art, ceremonies, Children’s literature, etc. Students will also choose a tribe of their choice from anywhere in the US to research and report on.

Make an Indigenous Oar

Teacher: Kilbourne

Join Brian from Agency Creek Studio to learn how to make an oar as the local tribe did many years ago.

Makerspace Stem

Teacher: Lazz

Makerspaces provide hands-on, creative ways to encourage students to design, experiment, build and invent as they deeply engage in science, engineering and tinkering. Explorer Multiple 3D rendering programs and turn your creation into reality with one of our state of the art 3D printers.

Baseball/ Softball

Teachers: McNabb and Nowlin

PE Course (students can ONLY take 1 PE course in J Term)

This course is designed to provide students baseball and Softball-specific development and fitness training. Skill building in the areas of fielding, hitting, throwing and game situations will be the primary focus. Also, there will be a goal to increase endurance, strength and flexibility through a focus in a specific sporting event and provide a foundation that will benefit the student (athlete). Students are encouraged to exhibit a high level of motivation, cooperation, and sportsmanship. Class activities include fielding drills, hitting drills, arm care, strength training and speed/agility development. There will also be an emphasis on team-building and competition. This course is open to all students, all levels.

Mindfulness

Teacher: Morrill

PE Course (students can ONLY take 1 PE course in J Term)

There are many emotional and mental stresses in teenage life and mindfulness will help prepare students for the challenges of life in a positive way. Mindfulness has been studied in schools and is shown to dramatically improve student’s physical and mental well-being. The class will be split into discussions on mindfulness (teacher and student lead), applications of mindfulness (yoga/meditation), and reflection (journaling/goal setting) on mindfulness.

We will watch a variety of films and have a variety of readings and analyses in an attempt to understand the impact of the Cold War on today's world. I promise a variety of great Cold War films!

Spielberg: The Third Decade (1994-2005)

From gritty historical dramas such as "Saving Private Ryan" and "Amistad" to the dark sci-fi trilogy of "A.I." "Minority Report" and "War of the Worlds"--with an occasional romp such as "Catch Me If You Can" and "The Terminal"--come see the final(?) installment of America's most successful and influential film director.

Choose Your Own Adventure

Collaborative Painting

Students will learn how to build and stretch a canvas as well as how to mix and use color successfully. American Sign Language 1&2

This course explores the work of master Japanese animator Hayao Miyazaki. Using his films and the existing scholarship around his work, we will examine how he handles themes including family, friendship, war, the human relationship with the natural world, and more.

Monstresses & Final Girls: Women in Horror

Teacher: Fajardo

Rated-R Permission slip required for this film class studying the role of women in classic horror films such as Carrie, Scream, Alien, and others. We'll be looking at their role in front of and behind the camera in this genre, plus their portrayal as victim, heroine, and monster.

How To Adult

Teacher: Hagen and Fountain-Miller

Course Description: This course will focus on developing workplace skills and certifications desired by potential employers. We will focus on getting the job, acing the interview, and being a terrific employee. We will build dynamic resumes, refine speaking skills and conduct practice interviews. We will also explore topics focusing on customer service within the restaurant industry and office environment (common first job experiences). We will acquire knowledge of wait staff best practices, restaurant table etiquette, and food handling safety requirements (Note:

We will earn our Food Handlers Card). We will earn our CPR/First Aid Certification with lots of hands-on learning and emergency scenario response practice! Community leaders and business owners will address the class in offering recommendations in support of exploring positive employment opportunities. Course fee: \$12 for CPR/First Aid registration/certification.

Folk Horror

Teacher: Gonzales

In this course, we will be digging into the subgenre of horror known as "folk horror." Folk horror uses elements of folklore to invoke fear. Typical elements include a rural or country setting and the movies explore themes of isolation, religion, the power of nature, and clashes between older, eldritch beliefs versus modern viewpoints and secular societies. We will be studying through a variety of media, including movies like *The Wicker Man* and *Midsommar*, as well as television episodes and short stories.

Broadcasting

Teacher: Hedger

Have you ever wanted to be a sports broadcaster? Have you ever wanted to get behind the scenes of a press conference? Do you dream of becoming a podcaster? If you answer yes to any of those this is the class for you. I will teach you the basics of sports/podcast broadcasting and you will be using equipment that you would be using in the real world. Join us and have fun exploring the world of broadcasters.

Conflict Simulation Board Games

Teacher: Kilbourne

Think of Risk on steroids. These games are historical based battles. You command one side and your opponent commands the other. Each take turns moving your army and attacking your opponent. Individual battles are determined by a die roll and how well you've planned the attack. Example games include Waterloo, The Russian Campaign, Afrika Korps. What you can expect to learn while in this class without even trying...geography, history, following specific rules, being organized and strategic planning.

Cornerstone Dog Training (Labrador Retriever)

Teacher: Lazz

Do you love dogs? Do you sometimes wish they would listen to you better? Well this is the course for you. Mr. Lazz will be teaching positive reinforcement training techniques with the aid of Cornerstone Gun Dog Academy (CGA). This course will have live in person dog training sessions daily with a two year old chocolate lab named Hank. We will be outside in January for short periods, so bring a coat and a change of shoes. (REQUIRED) Students cannot have allergies to dogs and MUST have a parent's approval with a signed waiver. (REQUIRED)

Social Changes and the Nature of Sports

This course will look at the evolution of sports and how social changes within our country have revolutionized sports in various facets. We will dive into critical factors that have sparked a multi-generational change and restructured how we play and view all sports today.

Piano Class

Develop piano playing skills at any level: beginner, intermediate, advanced.

Court Sports

Teacher: Morrill and Nowlin

PE Course (students can ONLY take 1 PE course in J Term)

This class will explore a variety of court sports including floor hockey, team handball, etc. The class is designed to teach students the fundamentals of the various activities and then allows the student to participate in games. The goal of this class is to introduce the student to as many court sport options so that you may find one that works for you and will help you stay fit and healthy in the future.

Visionary Business Projects

Projects can range from creating your own website, your very own digital video on business, public service announcements and much more!

Exploring Europe

Throughout this course, students will travel through time and space in order to explore the geography, history, culture, cuisine, and the arts of Western Europe. Through videos, stories, maps, pictures, and taste testing we will explore the diversity and beauty of Western Europe.

Famous Criminal Trials

Introduction to Calligraphy

Beginning Sewing

New students will be exposed to basic sewing and quilting skills, and learn either knitting or crocheting, and embroidery or cross stitch. Students will work on gaining skills and confidence through teacher guided projects that will culminate in the student choosing a personal project. Example projects to be completed are: cinch sacks, zipper pouches, cord caddies, pot holders, washcloths, pants hems, repairs, wall decorations, and more. Students interested in quilting or particular projects/patterns may need to make their own trip to a fabric/craft shop outside of class to purchase materials.

Contemporary World Issues

Teacher: Atkins

This course will allow students to study and explore political, social, and economic issues facing the world community. While the course will focus on current situations and issues, students will also examine historical causes and work to create “real world” solutions. In past offerings, this class has looked at issues such as the humanitarian crisis in Sudan/ Darfur, the Arab/Israeli conflict, China and the global trade issue, genocide, oil and natural resource issues. We will look to the news and current events to help guide our central area of interest. In the course of this class we will study related maps, histories, economies, and cultures to help our understanding. We will also look at some different models of International Relations.

Not-So-Bad Girls Part 3: film antiheroines

By request, here's another examination of women and girls who shake up the status quo. From outright felons ("Ocean's 8" "Three Billboards Outside Ebbing MO") to killer cliques ("Mean Girls") to dangerous secretaries ("9 to 5") and the ultimate stage mom ("Gypsy"), we've got a final round of female rule-breakers who unapologetically pursue what they want.

Drawing Bootcamp 1.0

Teacher: Barron

Explore various approaches to the practice and craft of drawing. Students will engage with both traditional and experimental methods of developing the drawn image. Equal attention will be paid to technical skills and creative interpretation/expression. This course does not require any prior experience with drawing.

Fish and Wildlife

Teacher: Byrd

Fish & Wildlife is a course geared for anyone interested in fishing and hunting in the Pacific Northwest. The focus of the course will be on species identification, ethical hunting, public land opportunities, hunting as conservation and the North American Wildlife Model. The course is

composed of individualized research assignments based on interest, short hunting and fishing videos, species identification and more!

Dissection Workshop

Teacher: Darlak

This unique learning opportunity is designed for individuals looking to expand their anatomy knowledge and dissection skills, or for those who have never had the opportunity to dissect before. We will focus on the dissection of animals, but will also take a peak at a few flowers to practice with delicate specimens. If time permits there may be an opportunity for dissecting some larger specimens.

Slam Poetry

Teacher: Deckelmann

This is not your grandpa's poetry class. This is not SSR. This is poetry; performed and reformed and performed again. This is drama class, English class, and music class—Slammed together. We will write, we will yell, we will listen; We will SLAM.

American Sports and Culture

Teacher: DunnWirth

This class will explore cultural changes and social trends through the lens of American sports. Through readings and films, we will consider the historical significance of landmark moments in American sports. We will also consider the influence of iconic athletes like Jackie Robinson, Billie Jean King, and Muhammad Ali.

Chick Flicks: For Better or For Worse

Teacher: Fajardo

Come study the cultural importance of weddings through your favorite medium—the chick flick. In this class, we'll watch films such as My Big Fat Greek Wedding, The Wedding Planner, Bride Wars, and others to study the film's messaging about love and marriage, thinking about the stereotypes, pressures, and function of the spectacle that is "the big day."

Engineering

Teacher: Fountain-Miller and Pinkstaff

This class is designed for students who are interested in applying mathematics, science, and technology to the real world task of designing structures. This also happens to be the job description of an engineer, so this class is also a useful 'first taste' of engineering for students who are considering engineering as a career option. Students will work in small groups on four projects involved in bridge engineering.

Theater- Regionals Prep

Teacher: Gonzales

This course is designed as a place where young thespians can work on acting or tech pieces to enter in the regional Oregon Thespians competition held the first weekend of February. Students will be expected to come into the class with ideas to develop and perfect a performance piece like a monologue, scene, or musical number, or a technical project like a set, lighting or sound design.

Board Games

Teacher: Hedger and R. Backus

Students will develop strategies and tactics and fine tune decision-making skills by playing various board games and puzzles. A few of the games students will play include Ticket to Ride, Catan, Risk, and Monopoly among others.

Projectile Motion

Teacher: Holzworth

This course is a math unit in Quadratic Equations, applied to projectile motion. Students may elect this course to improve their grade in Advanced Algebra 2A. This course will also serve as a credit recovery and students will be placed by counseling to recover credit in Advanced Algebra 2A.

Projects by CNC Router

Teacher: Kilbourne

A computer numeric control (CNC) router is a tool used to cut wood, plastics and even metals in 3D. During this J Term class you will learn how to create objects, create toolpaths and cut out projects using our two Shopbot CNC routers. Using a CNC router is fun, versatile and easy to learn. You can even incorporate the use of the Shopbots in our woodworking classes if you take this course.

Laser/Sublimation Products

Teacher: Lazz

Learn how to make all kinds of heat press transfers and Laser products. Personalize shirts, hats, coffee mugs. The possibilities are endless.

Net Sports

Teacher: Morrill and McNabb

PE Course (students can ONLY take 1 PE course in J Term)

This class is designed to help students learn and develop a basic understanding of various net sports. This class will be a competitive experience, playing such sports as volleyball, badminton,

and pickleball. Students will not only learn basic skills and strategies, but also learn activities they can play for a lifetime.

Advanced Sports Training

Teacher: Nowlin

PE Course (students can ONLY take 1 PE course in J Term)

This is a high-level weight lifting class for student-athletes (those who participate in a school sport) looking to gain a competitive advantage. It is highly encouraged that all of our student-athletes (male and female) take this course to help them get the most out of their athletic careers. This class will utilize a sports performance model to help students gain strength/speed throughout the year, help prevent injuries and allow them to compete at a high level. Student-athletes will participate in an advanced strength training program with an emphasis on Olympic Lifts (squats, clean, jerk and snatch). In addition to the weight room focus, students will also be doing speed work, agility work and plyometrics. Although there will be core lifts that every student-athlete is expected to execute, there will also be sports specific auxiliary movements to help your development in your chosen sport(s).

Foundations of Chess

Teacher: Poster

Chess is the classic game that develops focus, spatial thinking, and strategic application. The class is geared for all levels of chess players. All students will learn chess history, study classic chess scenarios, and will compete daily against other students in a low-stress environment.
