# **APPLICATION DICTIONARY**

(Resources: The Common Application & Collegeboard)

**Application Fee-** An application fee is a fee that a college charges you for applying to their institution. Some colleges will charge you a fee for applying, and the amount varies from one college to the next.

**CEEB Code-** A CEEB code is a unique identification number assigned to high schools, colleges, and universities by the College Board. The CEEB code may be used to help differentiate schools with similar names. Some international schools may not have an assigned CEEB code.

**Citizenship-** Citizenship is your status as a person recognized under the custom or law as being a member of a state or country. You may have multiple citizenships. Citizenship options may include: US citizen or US national, US Dual Citizen, US permanent resident, US Refugee, US Asylee, and Other (Non-US).

**Coed-** Coed is the term used to describe a college or university that offers the integrated education of male and female students in the same environment.

**College Admission Test Scores-** Most 4-year colleges, require that you send your scores from a college entrance exam (such as the SAT or ACT). Some colleges will only accept scores that are sent directly from the testing organization (collegeboard or actstudent). Check with colleges to verify their policy on receiving test scores.

**Common Application-** The Common Application is the name of an online system used by students to apply to over 600 colleges and universities across the country and around the world.

**Counselor-** A counselor is an individual who provides academic, career, and college readiness to all K-12 students through a school counseling program.

**Counselor Recommendation-** A counselor recommendation allows your high school counselor to provide a broad-based assessment of you as a student by addressing things like your academic, extracurricular, and personal characteristics.

**Deadline-** A deadline signifies the date by which you must submit your application materials.

**Early Action (EA)-** Early Action (EA) is an application process by which you apply and receive a decision much earlier than the regular decision notification date. Early Action is “non-binding.” In other words, if accepted by a college under the EA plan, you have no obligation to enroll.

**Early Decision (ED)-** Early Decision (ED) is an application process by which you commit to enrolling to a certain college if you’re admitted. Early Decision is a “binding” plan. This means that you can apply to other colleges but only one as Early Decision. If admitted Early Decision, you must withdraw your applications from other colleges.

**Essay-** An essay may also be referred to as a “personal essay” or “personal statement.” An essay allows students to tell their story using a writing prompt.

**FERPA-** The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of students education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

**Final Report-** The final report is a form that is submitted by your school and typically summarizes your academic performance through the end of your senior year of high school.

**First-Year-** You are a first-year applicant if you are projected to complete high school during the 2016-2017 academic year or if you have never enrolled at a college or university. If you have earned college credit in the past, please check with the individual institutions to confirm which application type is most appropriate for your situation.

**GPA-** Your GPA (grade point average) is an academic performance measurement calculated based of your grades.

**Midyear School Report-** Much like the Secondary School Report, this form is submitted by your high school; it typically includes the fall semester grades of your senior year and updates to your spring semester schedule (if any apply). Not all colleges require this form.

**Portfolio-** A portfolio is a supplemental form used to showcase your special talent in one or more subjects, such as the arts. Portfolios can be submitted to certain colleges that choose to consider them as part of the admission process.

**Recommenders-** Recommenders are individuals that you invite to provide an assessment or endorsement of you, enabling colleges to get a better idea of who you are.

**Regular Decision (RD)-** Regular decision is an application process by which you apply by a specified date and receive an admission decision in a clearly stated period of time.

**Rolling-** Rolling is the term used for a decision plan that lets students submit an application at any time throughout the year.

**Secondary School Report-** Some colleges require a Secondary School Report form to be completed by a high school official, usually a school counselor, with information about the school, the graduating class, and specific information about you. Your high school is responsible for sending this form.

**Transcript-** A transcript is essentially an inventory of the courses you've taken and the grades you've earned in those courses during your academic career.

## NOVEMBER:

**UO FRESHMEN SCHOLARSHIPS (C):** Some scholarships for incoming freshmen require an additional or separate application. Others are awarded automatically based on the materials in your undergraduate application for admission and/or financial information in your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Apply online at [https://financialaid.uoregon.edu/scholarships\\_freshmen](https://financialaid.uoregon.edu/scholarships_freshmen) Applications have various due dates ranging from *November 1* through *January 15*.

**\*ELK'S MOST VALUABLE STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP (SHS):** The Elks National Foundation has helped thousands of students who need financial assistance fulfill their dreams of attending college. The scholarship is open to any SHS student who is a U.S. Citizen and will be judged on scholarship, leadership, and financial need. ## DECEMBER:

**PORTLAND STATE UNIVERSITY (C):** Do you plan to attend Portland State University? Apply online at [https://portlandstate.scholarships.ngwebsolutions.com/CMXAdmin/Cmx\\_Content.aspx?cpId=199](https://portlandstate.scholarships.ngwebsolutions.com/CMXAdmin/Cmx_Content.aspx?cpId=199) All incoming freshman scholarships are due *December 1*.

**KAISER PERMANENTE HEALTH CARE CAREER (SHS):** Dream of becoming a health care professional? Scholarships are awarded in amounts of \$2,000, \$5,000, or \$10,000 to at least one Scappoose High School senior. You must be planning to pursue an education and career in an approved human health care field. Apply online at <https://kaiser-scholarship.fluidreview.com/> Application registration will close on *December 6*.

## JANUARY:

**\*LGBTQ SCHOLARSHIPS (NW):** The Pride Foundation awards scholarships to lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and straight ally student leaders in the Northwest. With just one application to complete, the Pride Foundation is proud to offer over 50 different scholarships. Apply online at <https://www.pridefoundation.org/what-we-do/scholarships/apply/> Applications are due *January 12*.

**\*PATHWAY OREGON SCHOLARSHIP (C):** Interested in attending UO? Do you have a GPA of 3.4 or higher and significant financial need (eligible for the Federal Pell Grant)? If so, apply to UO by January 15 and complete your FAFSA by February 15. If you meet the requirements and deadlines, you will automatically be considered for Pathway Oregon, which will cover the cost of UO's tuition after all of your other financial aid packages have been applied. ## **FEBRARY:**

**\*EASTERN OREGON FOUNDATION (C):** All scholarships help by the EOU Foundation are made by donations from private individuals. The EOU Foundation awards all scholarships based on the donor criteria as stipulated <https://www.eou.edu/foundation/scholarships/> Application is due **February 1**.

**\*OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS (C):** To be considered for one of the scholarship programs, students must complete the following: complete the OSU admission prior to the **February 1** application deadline. Complete all the scholarships questions, the insight resume, and indicate that you are interested in OSU scholarships on the admission application.

**\*AL FORTHAN MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP (O):** The Al Forthan Memorial Scholarship is awarded to an Oregon high school senior from a family affected by alcohol or drug addiction. Affected by addiction means you have been raised by a parent or guardian who has experienced addiction or you have abused alcohol. You may access this scholarship on the SHS counseling website. ## **MARCH:**

**\*OFFICE OF STUDENT ACCESS & COMPLETION SCHOLARSHIP (O):** One application to apply for over 450 scholarships just for Oregon residents! Visit [www.osac.state.or.us](http://www.osac.state.or.us) to apply. The deadline is **March 1**.

**\*SCHWEIGER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP (O):** Are you pursuing a career in construction or a construction-related field? Apply for the Schweiger Memorial Scholarship! The scholarship can be awarded for multiple years of education and can lead to internships to further assist qualified students. The scholarship is building the future for construction and engineering. Application is due March 1. For more information visit <http://www.advanced-american.com/scholarship/>

**\*OREGON TECH FOUNDATION (C):** OIT Foundation offers more than 115 scholarships to Oregon Tech students. Scholarship application deadline is **March 1**. For more information visit <http://www.oit.edu/college-costs/scholarships/all-students/otf>

**\*WESTERN OREGON UNIVERSITY (C):** WOU offers numerous scholarships to talented undergraduate students. Those admitted to the university for Fall 2017 should file the FAFSA by **February 1** and submit WOU scholarship applications by **March 1**. ## **JUNE:**

**\*OREGON PROMISE (O):** The Oregon Promise is a state grant that covers some or all tuition at any Oregon community college for recent high school graduates and GED recipients. You must be a recent Oregon high school graduate, enroll in an Oregon community college within 6 months of graduation, have a 2.5 cumulative GPA or higher, and be an Oregon resident at least 12 months prior to enrollment. To apply, go to [OregonStudentAid.gov](http://OregonStudentAid.gov), create an account within the OSAC student portal, complete the Oregon Promise Application, verify your GPA in the OSAC student portal, and file your FAFSA and list at least one Oregon community college. Deadline is **June 1**.
